




AFORCE BEYOND ACADEMIA














THE INTERSECTION OF HUMANITIES CULTURE & COMMUNITY



At Brown, she grappled with the complexities of academic gatekeeping, ultimately advocating for an inclusive approach to scholarship: "We cannot afford to not bring other people into the rooms that we're invited to."

This project, inspired by Toni Cade Bambara's essay 'What It Is I Think I'm Doing Anyhow', embodies her commitment to accessibility and collective growth.
